It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need. 



### Review

Our swimming percentages have increased from 37% last year to 59% this year. We ensured that any pupils who were struggling to swim had as much parental engagement as possible. Teachers approached parents at the earliest opportunity to feed back their level of swimming ability and encourage swimming outside of school. We worked on ways of maximising the time in the pool, providing additional lessons during the Summer Term for our weaker swimmers, reducing changing time etc. and ensuring as many pupils as possible achieve the expected standard in swimming at the end of primary school.
